Mount Auburn Cemetery Artist-in-Residence (AiR) Program History by Julie-Anne Whitney, Public Events Producer

Mount Auburn has a long history of sharing art with the public. In the mid-19th Century, the Cemetery commissioned a vast array of public art (i.e. monuments, sculptures, buildings, etc.) so that visitors could experience the site as an outdoor museum.

Today, Mount Auburn continues its dual mission of being an active cemetery and cultural landscape by offering an array of public events throughout the year. For nearly 40 years, Mount Auburn has been hosting public events that promote an appreciation and preservation of the Cemetery as a cultural and natural resource. With programs that focus on the arts, death education, healing from grief, history, horticulture, nature, and wildlife the Cemetery has long been a place for the community to convene for learning, enjoyment, and solace.

In 2014, as a way of expanding our public event offerings, Mount Auburn became the first cemetery in the United States to establish an artist residency program. The AiR program offers grants to local artists who are encouraged to create site-specific work that is unique and authentic to Mount Auburn. In the past ten years, we have worked with nearly 30 artists across different disciplines including film, music, theater, dance, sculpture, photography, painting, poetry, and more.

The Artist-in-Residence program has enabled us to create avenues for deeper connection with our visitors through intentional programming that centers on the Cemetery's values and expands Mount Auburn's ever-growing community. Through their thoughtful and imaginative work, our artists have interpreted and portrayed the Cemetery in compelling and surprising ways. Their work has brought thousands of visitors to Mount Auburn and has expanded what the Cemetery can be.

My Name is Harriet; Summertime Ode to Fall; Springtime

My Name is Harriet is from a collection of poems written about Mount Auburn resident Harriet Jacobs, the first Black woman to write a first-person narrative about the experience of being enslaved. *Summertime Ode to Fall* was written for Summer SOLSTICE 2024. *Springtime* was written in honor of the AiR Anniversary Celebration!

JENNIFER LIN (2021-2022)

The Gathering Place – Featuring Andy Taylor–Blenis, Joanie Block, Eleanor Duckworth, Paul Kafka–Gibbons, Karen Klein, Julie Leavitt, Jennifer Lin, and Vicky Steinitz

The Gathering Place abstractly represents, mourns, honors, and celebrates the spirits and lives of historic figures buried at Mount Auburn including Amy Lowell, Erna Rosenberg, Harriet Jacobs, Isabella Stewart Gardener, and Julia Ward Howe, among others.



LIZ WALKER (2022–2023) Dance of Arrival

Dance of Arrival explores stories of motherhood and new life juxtaposed with other parenthood realities found and experienced in the Cemetery. The piece was performed during Liz's third trimester of her first pregnancy and will be performed again today during her second pregnancy.

LONNIE STANTON (2024–2025) Grief to Gratitude

Grief to Gratitude explores different aspects of grief that are intrinsically tied to the human experience. The roaming performance will be performed in full for the first time on May 31 & June 1, 2025 at Auburn Lake.

TODD THIBAUD (2021–2022) Sweet Auburn; Louisa May

Two songs connected to Mount Auburn's history and to our relationships with grief, hope, and place. *Sweet Auburn* comes from the poem, "The Deserted Village" by Oliver Goldsmith. *Louisa May* was inspired by Joseph Story who lost his daughter of the same name just five months before giving his beloved Mount Auburn Cemetery consecration address on September 24, 1831.



EDEN RAYZ (2023–2024) Aboriginal Sensible Muchness

This piece was written for *Reborn: Musical Innovations with the Bigelow Chapel Organ Pipes*, a death-aware musical performance that celebrated the 100th Anniversary homecoming of the Bigelow Chapel pipe organ after it was decommissioned by Mount Auburn and reformed by Eden as a new multi-component instrument called Argent & Sable. The piece, along with Eden's other original composition *Lux Aeterna*, explores collective grief, reinvention, ritual, and the abstraction of time.

IRA KLEIN (2022–2023) The Oak Cycle

The Oak Cycle is a series of songs inspired by the large oak tree collection at Mount Auburn. The series represents a lens through which the artist could express his wonder at the Cemetery's natural environment.



IRA KLEIN & LIZ WALKER At the Seam of Life & Death

In July of 2023, for the first time in the AiR program history, two former Artists-in-Residence came together to create a collaborative work. *At the Seam of Life & Death* was inspired by the Cemetery as a place of transition and remembrance. The music focuses on the beauty of the natural world while the choreography explores our connection to the materiality of the earth.

THIERRY BORCY & MADGE EVERS (2022-2023)

Mount Auburn Sanctuary: a New Way of Seeing

A New Way of Seeing explores the transformation found in death, grief, and rebirth. The images were created through photography and mushroom spore print.

BILLY HICKEY (2023-2024)

An (Un)common Inheritance: the Beauty & Wonder of Mount Auburn's Ecosystem

An (Un)common Inheritance is a photographic story of the wildlife and horticultural environment at the Cemetery and the many staff and volunteers who protect and preserve it.

ZHONGHE (ELENA) LI (2021–2022) *The Art of Living Together*

Through the ancient art of Chinese papercutting and modern multimedia art, *The Art of Living Together* depicts the Yin-Yang balance, biodiversity, and harmony between humans and nature.

SIMONE NEMES (2022–2023) "Spring" & "Summer"

For her residency, Simone created four seasonal illustrations that featured urns and monuments adorned with native plants and animals. The works depict the balance of life and death as a core Cemetery value.

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PONNAPA PRAKKAMAKUL (2021–2022)

Mount Auburn: Seasons of Change

Seasons of Change explores the concept of change through the landscape foliage and colors of the sky above/around Mount Auburn. The changing scenes are created through mixed media paintings and abstract pastel on paper.

JILL SLOSBURG-ACKERMAN (2022–2023) Mourning Benches

Mourning Benches combines art and utility on a deeply personal level. Inspired by the desire to sit closer to her husband's grave, Jill created a series of "mourning benches" to be used by people visiting the graves of their loved ones.

MARKEL URIU (2024-2025)

Plucked From Earth to Bloom

Through the art of paper-weaving, this work is a portrait of Mount Auburn that explores the Cemetery's history and ecology through images of the physical landscape sourced from MAC's Historical Collections & Archives, satellite imagery, and photographs taken by the artist.

JOHN M. WILLIAMS (2022-2023)

"Spring" & "Summer"

Through the art of cut paper collage, John created four seasonal collages inspired by different parts of the Mount Auburn landscape.

Her work explores the relationship between humans and their environment, focusing on cultural displacement and sense of belonging. FATIMA SECK is a teacher, poet, and community artist. Through public and community-centered projects, Fatima explores Black history, archival expansion, public space, land and materiality, and Black childhood. She is deeply grounded in pedagogy and social engagement, and has worked as an educator and teaching artist at several local public schools and institutions including the ICA Boston, where she currently facilitates their teen Photo Collective program. Her poem, "Carrots," was selected for the 2023 Mayor's Poetry Program and was displayed at Boston City Hall.

LONNIE ANELA O'KALANI is a proud native Hawaiian based in Boston. She is a dance artist and educator. She currently performs with Jean Appolon Expressions, Peter DiMuro, Lynn Modell, and Continuum Dance. Formerly, she worked as a performer and teacher for 10 years with Prometheus Dance. Lonnie is committed to providing dance education that is rooted in somatic exploration for all bodies. Her dance-making is often site specific or responsive, highlighting the resiliency of nature and humanity's integral role as a part of the natural world. Lonnie is on faculty at the Boston Conservatory at Berklee and The Harvard Dance Center.

MARKEL URIU is an interdisciplinary artist from Seattle, WA, currently based in Boston while earning her master's in landscape architecture from the Harvard Graduate School of Design. Her work explores impermanence, maintenance, and the unseen. Drawing from her Japanese and Irish-American heritage, she is particularly interested in liminal spaces, and explores these concepts through research, ephemeral botanical narratives, installations, and two-dimensional work. Her current work investigates the ways we view ourselves in relationship to other humans, species, and ecosystems and how it manifests in our landscapes. LIA PIKUS is a cellist, composer, and illustrator whose practice centers on art's ability to cultivate experiences of presence and connection, both within community and in dialogue with the natural world. By drawing and reflecting on natural processes, Lia seeks to help audiences make emotional and sensory connections with their environments. As a Thomas J. Watson fellow (2023), she researched this connective power on a global scale, exploring the role of art in fostering community around the world. This research formed the foundation for her current explorations in live looping as a form of mediative ritual. It is also the central focus of her debut EP, Ritual, released in 2024. Lia was an Artist-in-Residence at Shenandoah National Park in 2024 and at Mothership NYC in 2023. She is currently pursuing a Masters in Religion, Ethics, and Politics at Harvard University. www.liapikus.com
